ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2022-23

The Association has been fully occupied with organizing various events & activities during the entire year, right from Annual General Meeting 2022 are as given below:

70[™] Annual General Meeting

The 70th Annual General Meeting of the All India Rubber Industries Association was held on 27th September, 2022 hybrid mode.

70th Annual General Meeting 2021-22

The gallant journey of All India Rubber Industries Association, AIRIA from its year of inception in the year 1945, has been commendable. Even though there was no restriction of pandemic of covid imposed by the government, the Annual General meeting of the Association was

conducted via hybrid mode for the convenience of the members.

At beginning an emcee Ms. Komal welcome all members of the association for the AGM of the Association and gave brief introduction of event of the day and started with national anthem.

He welcomed all the Members, introduce AIRIA, invited the dignitaries on the dais: President Dr Sawar Dhanania, Sr Vice President- Shashi Singh, Vice President Mr. Vipan Mehta (Virtual), Chairman Western Region – Mr. Prasant Wani (virtual), Chairman Southern Region – Mr. Chandramouli Suresh, Chairman Northern Region-Mr. Anay Gupta, and Chairman Eastern Region – Mr. Kamlesh Jain.

She invited the dignitaries for the lighting of lamp. Thereafter Mr. Vipan Mehta was requested to give welcome address. Mr. Mehta gave his opening remark with current scenario of the rubber industry and economy welcome chief guest Dr Sawar Dhanania and other dignitaries.

Thereafter the anchor gave brief introduction of the president Dr Sawar Dhanania and invited him for his address to the august





gathering. The president offered sincere condolences to members and colleagues present who have lost their family members, friends and colleagues and requested members to observe two minutes silence for sad demise of Mr. Manu M Patel and Mr. Shailendra Agarwal.

He said that despite the COVID 19 effects still being felt in some parts of the world, the knock-on effects of the war in Ukraine, geopolitical upheaval, inflation, and other obstacles, the global economy would expand and probably exceed \$104 trillion by the end of the year. This was the prediction of IMF earlier. However, the outlook for global growth has dimmed recently. Advanced economies' paths are once more diverging. While the advanced economies are contracting, emerging market economies display some resilience.

The global trade growth in 2022 and 2023 may slow by more than previously expected, reflecting the decline in global demand and supply chain problems. Given the dominance of the dollar in trade invoicing and the detrimental effects on demand and imports in nations with dollar-denominated liabilities, the appreciation in 2022 is also likely to have slowed global trade growth.

Moving from the global perspective to our country, India's GDP projection has been lowered to 7.4% from 8.2% in 2022. For India, the change mostly reflects less favourable external

conditions. However, India joined forces with 17 other nations on July 20, 2022, during the Supply Chain Ministerial Forum and taking advantage of the start of friend shoring. Friend-shoring seeks to fortify ties and diversify our supply chains. It also aims to lower risks for both our economy and the partners.

In spite of bleak outlook for global growth, India's industrial sectors are growing more upbeat about demand conditions in the manufacturing, services, and infrastructure sectors, according to RBI's quarterly enterprise surveys. On all key lines, freight rates decreased in July 2022. Domestic manufacturers anticipate increased production in the second half of 2022–2023; firms in the services and infrastructure sectors anticipate increased turnover.

As you all know, the rubber goods sector is often clubbed with the plastics industry in order to compile and disseminate crucial data on a consolidated basis. The latest data of our National Statistical Office reveals that the industrial output of our Rubber & Plastic products sector grew merely 2.5% in April-July 2022.

Natural rubber and synthetic rubber are the fundamental raw materials of the rubber industry. The most recent data on our domestic NR and SR production and consumption are for the month of April 2022. While domestic consumption of NR increased by 5.45% to 1.16 lakh tonnes and SR by 2.34% to 63,655 tonnes in April 2022, domestic



production of NR increased by only 2.5% to 41,000 tonnes and SR by 7.17% to 43,500 tonnes.

Rising costs and unpredictability of raw materials have become a major concern for our manufacturing industry. MSMEs are typically vulnerable to supply disruptions or spikes in the prices of critical raw materials.

In the case of NR, there was some easing of price pressures in recent months.

As per our Wholesale Price Index, domestic NR prices decreased on average by around 17% from April to August, 2022. However, the prices for rubber chemicals, carbon black, and SR continued to be extremely unpredictable. The WPI data indicate price rise by an average of 49.5% for SR, 82% for Carbon Black, and 40% for rubber chemicals between April and August, 2022. Given the situation, manufacturers must seek out suitable alternatives and implement

programmes like waste recovery and recycled goods, among other strategic measures.

Our export of Rubber & Articles Thereof (HS 40) increased by roughly 17% to US\$ 1702.3 million. Exports of Footwear made of rubber, canvas, etc. increased by about 87% to US\$ 100.61 million. If more MSME members of the rubber sector were involved in the export trade, exports could have increased further.

MSMEs dominate the non-tyre segment of the Indian rubber industry but are underrepresented in global trade. Many of them are not exportoriented and often involve local expansion as opposed to exporting abroad. The globalisation of MSME activities in the modern world is a critical issue that non-exporting MSMEs cannot ignore.

What I feel is that considering the present situation the constituents of our industry and trade should prioritize their business initiatives as under:

- Increase operational efficiency,
- Transform existing business processes,
- Improve customer experience,
- Increase cyber security protection,
- Optimize employee digital experience,
- Improve employee productivity,
- Improve profitability,
- Introduce new digital revenue streams,
- Enhance/enable new product development,
- Increase topline revenue for the business,
- Improve talent acquisition/retention,
- Monetize Company's data,
 - Meet compliance requirements, etc.

In the post-COVID new normal, I want to emphasise the need of focusing on inclusive and sustainable growth. I am convinced that our members have a strong understanding of business, a wealth of information, and a diverse set of talents. They surely would make their business excellence role models. I wish them the very best!





AIRIA Export and Domestic Awards for 2021-22

Anchor invited the **National Convener - Domestic Awards & Events Mr. Vinod Bansal for his** note on the awards.

Mr. Vinod Bansal welcomed dignitaries for the AGM and gave brief background of the awards presented by the Association.

The AIRIA had instituted the export awards under various categories in the year 1985 and subsequently domestic awards were instituted in the year 2016 to recognize excellent performance of members.

To encourage the first-time exporters, we had relaxed our criterions and appealed them to apply but response has not been satisfactory. He requested all the members to spread the word so that new exporters are encouraged.

ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT'S AT 71TH AGM

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Dear Members and all others concerned

Namaste, Kushalam Sarbam

With great delight, I heartily welcome you all to the 71st Annual General Meeting and I feel honoured to write down this message for the Annual Report of All India Rubber Industries Association (AIRIA) for the year 2022-23.

Part 1

World Economic Situation and Prospects as of mid-2023

Prospects for a robust global economic recovery remain dim amid stubborn inflation, rising interest rates and heightened uncertainties. Instead, the world economy faces the risk of a prolonged period of low growth as the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. According to the report, the world economy is now projected to grow by 2.3 percent in 2023 (+0.4 percentage points from the January forecast) and 2.5 per cent in 2024 (-0.2 percentage points), a slight uptick in the global growth forecast for 2023. In the United States, resilient household spending has prompted an upward revision of growth forecast to 1.1 percent in 2023. The European Union's

economy—driven by lower gas prices and robust consumer spending—is now projected to grow by 0.9 percent. China's growth this year is now forecast at 5.3 percent as a result of COVID-19-related restrictions being lifted.

Indian Economic Situation and Prospects

According to the World Bank, India is one of the fastest growing economies of the world and is poised to continue on this path, with aspirations to reach high middle-income status by 2047, the centenary of Indian independence. It is also committed to ensuring that its continued growth path is equipped to deal with the challenges of climate change, and in line with its goal of achieving net-zero emissions by 2070.

In FY 2022-23, India's real GDP expanded by an estimated 6.9 percent. Growth was underpinned by robust domestic demand, strong investment activity bolstered by the government's push for



investment in infrastructure, and buoyant private consumption, particularly among higher-income earners. The composition of domestic demand also changed, with government consumption being lower due to fiscal consolidation.

Since Q3 FY 2022-23, however, there have been signs of moderation, although the overall growth momentum remains robust. The persisting headwinds – rising borrowing costs, tightening financial conditions and ongoing inflationary pressures – are expected to weigh on India's growth in FY 2023-24. Real GDP growth is likely to moderate to 6.3 percent in FY 2023-24 from the estimated 6.9 percent in FY 2022-23.

Both the general government fiscal deficit and public debt to GDP ratio increased sharply in FY 2020-21 and have been declining gradually since then, with the fiscal deficit falling from over 13 percent in FY 2020-21 to an estimated 9.4 percent in FY 2022-23. Public debt has fallen from over 87 percent of GDP to around 83 percent over the same period. The consolidation has largely been driven by an increase in revenues and a gradual withdrawal of pandemic-related stimulus measures. At the same time, the government has remained committed to increasing capital spending, particularly on infrastructure, to boost growth and competitiveness.

Rubber Sector

In India, there is a well-established rubber production sector and fast-growing rubber products manufacturing and consuming sector. The Rubber Industry value chain begins from NR plantations and ends with a huge range of dry rubber and latex-based products. Historically, NR was a regulated commodity with strong tariff protection and domestic market regulations. The key factors which have contributed to the growth of the Indian rubber industry are the positive intervention of institutional agencies aiming at self-sufficiency and import substitution. Most rubber products including tyres require blends of natural rubber (NR) and synthetic rubber (SR).

The National Rubber Policy (NRP), 2019 envisages a well-developed value-chain of environmentally sustainable and globally competitive rubber industry, comprising natural and other forms of rubber and products thereof and ancillary sectors, capable of supplying materials and products of international standards to domestic and world markets, with focus on the welfare of the entire stakeholder community and national economic progress.

FTA can boost the rubber industry

The concept of free trade is the opposite of trade protectionism or economic isolationism. Countries often agree to FTAs if their economic structures are complementary, not competitive. India is a party to free trade agreements (FTAs) and other trade agreements with many countries and trade blocks and is negotiating with many others. Since the increase in the import duty of compounded rubber announced in the budget 2023 will bring it on par with tariffs for imported natural rubber, domestic farmers are benefitted to avail a higher price for their produce.

The insights derived from interactions with the auto industry in India, review of non-tariff barriers to trade, review of cost competitiveness and ease of doing business across countries, provide a way forward for increasing global market access and a strategy to negotiate trade agreements.

Need for Skill Development among Rubber Farmers

There is a need for more Training and skill development that would form a major component of the project and would involve creating infrastructure for training facilities, conducting training programmes for farmers and tappers on best practices and technologies for more production. In order to achieve the optimum production level of rubber, smallholders require appropriate training. There is also a wide gap between modern or improved agricultural practices and local ones. Hence the existence of training needs a gap to fill.



It is defined that training needs as skill, knowledge and attitude an individual requires in order to overcome problems. From the definition above, it is clear that training is an essential resource, which will direct knowledge and skill towards production.

Automation in Establishing the growth of the Rubber Market in India

Automation is the major element of modern manufacturing and the key to success. The correct incentive for applying automation is to increase productivity and quality beyond what is possible in a conventional way in order to realize economies of scale or predictable quality levels. Overall industrial automation can help organizations improve their performance, reduce costs, enhance competitiveness, and increase their ability to respond to changing market conditions

The benefits of automation in the industry are numerous and can have a significant impact on an organization's performance and competitiveness. Some of the key benefits include:

- Increased efficiency and productivity: Automated systems can work 24/7 without breaks or downtime, allowing for faster and more consistent production;
- Improved quality: Automated systems are more precise and consistent than human workers, leading to improved product quality and reduced defects;
- 3. Enhanced safety: Automated systems can perform dangerous and repetitive tasks, reducing the risk of workplace accidents and injuries;
- Cost savings: Automated systems can reduce labor costs, lower energy consumption, and reduce material waste;
- 5. Improved data analysis: Automated systems can collect and analyze vast amounts of data in real-time, providing valuable insights into production processes

- and enabling organizations to make datadriven decisions; and
- 6. Scalability: Automated systems can be easily scaled up or down to meet changes in demand, allowing organizations to quickly respond to market conditions.

The rubber goods manufacturing industry includes an advanced technology-based and large capital-owned automotive tyre sector and a predominantly labour-intensive, technologically primitive and small capital-based non-tyre sector. The products in the non-tyre sector, particularly the latex-based segment, are manufactured with natural rubber accounting for more than 60% of the cost of production. The viability of non-tyre products from micro and small enterprises is contingent on the price of NR. The hike in NR price has destabilized the micro and small peasant industries, particularly in the non-tyre sector.

MSMEs are so important to India's economy and commerce, we believe that India's free trade agreements (FTAs) should include provisions to address the special concerns, demands and barriers that MSMEs may face while doing business in foreign markets. It is suggested that government should take steps to ensure that the terms of the FTAs benefit the MSMEs for internalization, with trade facilitation mainstreamed in MSME development goals. "MSMEs can work world-wide by creating a level playing export infrastructure, improving their financing conditions, educating them about suitable marketing channels and facilitating their working with trading companies.

Gap between the demand and Supply of Rubber in India

As per prevailing trends, Natural Rubber (NR) production in India will not be sufficient to meet the consumer industry's demands as consumption is expected to reach 1500,000 tonnes by 2025-26.

Other than import, synthetic rubber serves as a substitute for natural rubber in many cases, especially when improved material properties



are required. But Natural Rubber is better than Synthetic Rubber. A benefit of natural rubber over synthetic rubber is that it has higher tensile strength, higher tear resistance and low odour compared to synthetic rubber. Furthermore, synthetic rubbers can have excellent heat resistance, lower temperature resistance and improvements in heat ageing. Natural Rubber latex has extreme elongation, tear resilient and durability properties and Synthetic Rubber is the term for artificially moderated rubber which has been mainly synthesized from petroleum byproducts. Synthetic rubber is commonly known for its elasticity.

In general, synthetic rubber offers better resistance to abrasion than natural rubber, as well as superior resistance to chemicals, fluids, ozone, electrical heat, and the effects of aging. Many types of synthetic rubber are flame-resistant, so they can be used as insulation for electrical devices. Synthetic (man-made) rubber can be produced through a chemical process, but people have not been able to produce synthetic rubber that has all the properties of natural rubber. So, natural rubber cannot be replaced by synthetic rubber in most of its applications.

Import and export of natural rubber in FY 2022-23

The total import of natural rubber during 2022-23 was 5,28,677 tonnes as against 5,46,369 tonnes during 2021-22. India imports most of its Natural rubber from Indonesia, Vietnam and Thailand and is the 2nd largest importer of Natural rubber in the World.

The country exported 3,700 tonnes of NR during 2022-23 compared to 3,560 tonnes during 2021-22. An increase in yield, tappable area and area tapped during the year, etc., have contributed to the rise in NR production.

The export of Rubber & Articles thereof (HS 40) was at USD 4685.0 million in 2022-23 and constituted around 1.03% share in India's total exports and a growth of 1.06% compared to the previous year.

Industry wants import levy on natural rubber removed

The Hindu Bureau

The All India Rubber Industries Association (AI-RIA) has urged the government to not impose further restrictions on the import of rubber compounds.

The industry imported 1,12,500 tonnes in 2021 under the 4005 Compounded rubber, unvulcanised, in primary forms or in plates, sheets or strip' category to make products such as conveyor belts and noses, AIRIA president Ranesh Keiriwal said.

The government levied



10% basic duty, 18% IGST

and 10% surcharge.
The import levy on natural rubber comprises bas-ic duty 25%, additional duty 5% and surcharge 10%. AIRIA wants the government to remove the duty. In India, production of natural rubber is insufficient to meet the demand (con sumption) of 12.38 lakl tonnes (2021-2022).

Mr. Kejriwal said India did not produce rubber EPDM (ethylene propylene diene monomer) and its prices had doubled due to the pandemic and the Rus-sia-Ukraine war. Hence, the Centre should not only encourage production of rubber EPDM (synthetic rubber), but also reduce the import duty, he added

He also urged against giving duty sops under bi-lateral trade pacts for rubber products.

AIRIA formulating PLI scheme for Centre to promote rubber goods

The All India Rubber Industries Association (AIRIA) is formulating a productivity-linked incentive scheme (PLI) for the government's consideration to promote rubber goods production in the country, AIRIA President Ramesh Kejriwal has said. The association is consulting other stakeholders too and the policy will be ready in the next 3-6 months, Kejriwal told businessime in an online

in an online interaction.

EYEING INDIA

"The formulation of the scheme is in its early stage," he said. The PLI scheme is expected to give an impetus to the rubber goods industry in In-dia, which is now emerging as an alternative to China. "A lot of buyers abroad are looking at the Indian market and have shifted to our products. There

could be about 20-25 per cent shift from China to India,"

shift from China to India," Kejriwal said.
The Centre should come up with a benchmark price for natural rubber to encourage farmers. "If prices are not re-munerative, farmers will not grow the crop in the coming years and will switch over to

other crops," he said.
This is important since natural rubber production, which
increased to a nine-year high
last fiscal, has begun to inase over the last couple of

years after decreasing continuously. Currently, natural rubber production in the country is 7.58 lakh tonnes (IV) and the demand is pegged at 12.5 lt. India has to import to meet the demand, which increased to a three-year high last fiscal, to make up the gap. "There is still a 40 per cent gap between demand and supply," the AIRIA president said, adding that the Centre should encourage higher area under natural rubber by providing incentives to growers. On natural rubber to be rolled to the next 2-3 months. "They will recover after that, at least between 10 and 20 per cent," he said. There was a free fall in natural rubber prices in 20.2 s natural rubber prices in 2022 due to various reasons such as the Ukraine war and the Covid regulations in China. Prices of latex declined to ₹120 a kg from ₹150. "Sheet rubber prices declined to ₹150 from ₹180," Kejriwal said.

Diploma Program in Rubber Technology was started in the year 1999 by AIRIA in collaboration with Directorate Technical Education (DTE) & Government Polytechnic, Mumbai. This Diploma program is the only one of its kind in Maharashtra. It is vibrating symbol of "Institute – Industry Cooperation program "promoting purposeful technical education in the field of Rubber. The program is a good blend of theory and practical including six months actual in plant training in the industry.



Admission

The duration of the course is of 3 years, in which the 6th semester is In-plant training. The admission to this course last year was 11 students against the intake capacity of 30 students intake capacity of the course is 30 students. Although the quality of students needs improvement for want of good lecturers from the industry, all 100% students are employed by the industry. There is always a scope of improvement in the quality of students passing out. AIRIA is doing its best to put more lecturers in place and provide better training.

Till date this diploma program has produced 400 technicians who are serving the rubber industry in different capacities and fields of production, marketing, and quality control etc.





NOTE '1' OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS FORMING PART OF THE BALANCE SHEET AS AT 31st MARCH, 2023 AND INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT FOR THE YEAR ENDED ON THAT DATE:

1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) GENERAL:

The financial statements are prepared based on the historical cost convention, by applying applicable Accounting Standards and as a going concern. The preparation of financial statements is in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as applicable in India (Indian GAAP). The company follows mercantile system of accounting and recognizes income and expenses on accrual basis unless stated otherwise in the notes and except the items with significant uncertainties.

b) Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of financial statement in conformity with accounting standard requires the Management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions. These estimates, judgments and assumptions affects the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of financial statement and reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual result could differ from those estimates. As soon as the Management is aware of the changes, appropriate changes in estimates are made. The effects of such changes are reflected in the period in which such changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to financial statement.

c) REVENUE RECOGNITION:

- I. Membership subscriptions, which remain unpaid as at the close of the year, are not accounted for except the amount as received out of such unpaid subscription close to the adoption of the financial statements by the Managing Committee.
 - Entrance Fees are credited to Capital Fund being part of the Corpus Fund.
- II. The company accounts for the Service Export Incentives receivable as and when applied for with appropriate authority and only when there is reasonable certainty of the receipt of such incentive in cash or kind. The incentives in kind are valued at the realisable value in the ordinary course of business.
- III. Any claims, interest, insurance claim or any other income is recognised only when it is reasonably certain that amount is due and certainty exists regarding receipt of such sum.

d) PROPERTY PLANT AND EQUIPMENT:

Property Plant and Equipment are carried at cost net of input credit, less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any. All costs, including financial costs till the date of put to use of assets and also includes changes on account of foreign exchange contracts and adjustments if any arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the Property, Plant and Equipment.

e) INTANGIBLE ASSETS:

Intangible assets are stated at cost of acquisition and amortized over the estimated useful life of such assets.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

f) DEPRECIATION / AMORTISATION:

- I. In respect of tangible fixed assets, depreciation is provided on written down value method at the rates and in the manner specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.
- II. Intangible assets are depreciated over a period of benefit on straight line bases.

g) IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS:

Impairment loss of permanent nature in relation to the assets is recognized wherever the carrying amount of an asset is in excess of its recoverable amount and the same is recognized as an expense in statement of Income & Expenditure account and carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount.

h) INVESTMENTS:

Long-term investments are carried at cost. However, provision for diminution is made to recognise a decline, other than temporary, in the value of investments, such reduction being determined and made for each investment individually. Short Term investments are carried at cost.

i) BORROWING COST:

Borrowing cost which is directly attributable to acquisition of Qualifying Property, Plant and Equipment are capitalised. All other borrowing costs are charged to Income & Expenditure Account.

j) FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS:

- Foreign currency transactions during the year are booked at the applicable RBI rates on the date of transactions or rate realised on or before the date of transaction.
- Monetary Assets & Liabilities related to foreign currency transactions, remaining unsettled at the end of the year are translated at RBI rate prevailing on reporting date.
 Resultant gains / losses on such translations, other than those related to Fixed Assets are recognized in the Income & Expenditure Account.

k) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS:

Eligible employees receive the benefit from Employee Provident Fund, which is defined benefit plan. Both the eligible employees and Company Contributes to Provident Fund and the contribution are regularly deposited with Employees Provident Fund Authorities. The Employers' Contribution to Employees Provident Fund is charged to the Income and Expenditure Account.

The company estimated and provided for the liability towards the Employee's Gratuity and leave encashment as per the policy framed for the encashment and enjoyment of the leave. The company is in process of appropriately funding these liabilities.

I) TAXES ON INCOME:

The company is charitable organisation and income is eligible for exemption under the provisions of section 11 and 12 of Income Tax Act, 1961. The tax provision as applicable is made in the books of accounts.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The company is not required to make any provision for deferred tax asset or liability in view of special provisions applicable to the taxation of income of such charitable organisation and there are no reversible timing differences warranting provision of such deferred tax assets or liability as per Accounting Standard 22 "Accounting for Taxes on Income".

m) PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS:

A provision is made based on a reliable estimate when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle an obligation. Contingent Liabilities, if material, are disclosed by way of notes to accounts. Contingent assets are not recognized or disclosed in the financial statements.

2. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

- a) Company is a charitable organization established and operating for advancement of objects of general public utility. Company is registered under Section 12AA of Income Tax Act,1961. The provisions of tax payable as applicable under The Income Tax Act, 1961 is made on the bases of applicable provisions of Income Tax Act, 1961 and considering the past history of assessments in the case of company.
- b) The movement of publications is controlled under the overall supervision of the Secretary General. However, there is no system of maintaining inventory for the said materials and the same are charged to Income and Expenditure account. Inventory of Gift articles and promotional material are not carried forward and are expensed to income and expenditure account.
- c) Estimated amounts of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for Rs. NIL (Previous period Rs.Nil)/.
- d) The information as required to be disclosed under the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises Development Act, 2006 has been determined to the extent such parties have been identified on the basis of information available with the Company.
